The three villages served by the school, given the task of naming it, chose ‘The La’Angum Learning Centre.’ The word ‘la’angum’ means “many hands make light work” or “together we can achieve.” Parents and community elders knew that the school was the product of many people working together, contributing what they could - founder Alice Iddi-Gubbels, who dreamed that children in her homeland could have access to quality, child-centered education that allowed them to learn first in their native tongue; the initial Oklahoma City Board of Directors who created the legal framework, did first fundraising, and achieved PAMBE Ghana’s non-profit status in the U.S. and Ghana; local government officials; the locals in Ghana who donated the land and provided labor and logistical support to create the first structures; the village elders who created a system to select the students; and volunteers, friends and donors like you, who, knowing they would never visit the school, contributed time, talent, and funds to make the school a reality.

La’Angum Learning Centre was named partly in acknowledgement of the many hands who had worked together to create the fledgling school, but also in faith, now borne out, that the commitment of so many would flourish and grow to create a complete school that would support and nourish students from pre-school through sixth grade, and beyond.

The prescience and faith of Ghanaians who named the school has been confirmed and rewarded. If you receive this newsletter, then you are in some way, part of the ‘La’Angum’ community. This issue is dedicated to you. Thank you, on behalf of the Board, the teachers, communities, and most importantly, the children.

If you were fortunate to see Burkina Faso's Eric Kabore, aka Kaberic, perform at Full Circle Bookstore in 2014, you likely saw the enthusiastic participation of PAMBE Ghana supporters Nancy and Bill Majors in Kaberic's exuberant drumming and dance party.

Nancy devoted three years in the mid-1970's teaching math at a girls' high school in Cape Coast, Ghana, through the Peace Corps. Years later, drawn to shop at PAMBE Ghana's inaugural Global Market,

Nancy and Bill met PAMBE Ghana founder and Executive Director Alice Iddi-Gubbels, who happened to be at the Market that day. Global Market Recap

Net proceeds for the 2016 holiday exceeded \$16,000!

We could not be more grateful for Chesapeake Energy's generous contribution of the space that has housed the market for the last three years. Big news: the building sold and we have lost the space. A team of volunteers, including Casady Upper School and Classen SAS students, packed up the store contents and moved it to a storage building, where it awaits a new home. What a Difference a Year Makes!

La'Angum Learning Centre is located on a dry, rocky plot and has no running water or water well. Little by little, PAMBE Ghana built a water collection and containment system. Gutters line school buildings and catch water during the rainy season. The gutters discharge into large tanks. This system worked well until early 2016, when we learned there was no water left – all six concrete tanks were completely dry. A quick inspection revealed that the primary storage tanks were badly degraded and leaking. The precious water had drained, unseen, into the ground. What to do? Unbudgeted repairs would be expensive, and the rainy season approached. Without a close supply of water to support refreshment and hygiene, students and teachers would need to devote time and energy hauling water by bucket from distant sources. And, if the rainy season passed without a repaired containment system to store the water, the water deficit would continue into 2017.

Again, our friends came to the rescue. Donations ‘poured’ in, large and small. Many of you lined up to ‘put your fingers in the dike’ -- water puns ‘flowed freely’ as with gratitude, the Board watched the contributions ‘stream in’ until the construction could begin.

Funding included two generous donations from Hope H2O Foundation led by Travis Brown of Oklahoma City. These funds supported drilling of a borehole in 2015 and the concrete water tank repairs in 2016.

Repair and new construction was completed in time for the 2016 rainy season. Success! Initial spot checks in Spring 2016 showed that the tanks were holding water, but the real proof came when follow up was done in January 2017. Of the three large water tanks, one was empty but another completely full, and the last partially so. The repairs held, and we hope will last ten years.




In Memoriam



Paul Milburn

February 10, 1931-November 25, 2016

With heavy hearts, Alice and the PAMBE Ghana Board and the staff and students of La'Angum Learning Centre in November 2016 said farewell to early supporter and dear friend, philanthropist Paul Milburn. Paul was exceedingly generous. Yet ever mindful of the industry and principles that led to his business successes, he required that funds be managed with good stewardship. Paul imposed a 'matching fund' stipulation on all grants provided PAMBE Ghana. The pledged Milburn funds were never available until they were matched, dollar-for-dollar, by contributions from new supporters, or funds from past supporters who increased their donation. While prudent, this requirement also was in tune with the Spirit of La'Angum, in that it encouraged and fostered a growing community of vibrant support.

Prior to founding Paul Milburn Acreages, Paul taught vocational distributive education and general business in New Mexico and Oklahoma, obtaining a Master's in Vocational Education from Oklahoma State University. Together with his wife, former teacher Ann Milburn, he supported construction of substantial portions of the La'Angum Learning Centre campus in Northern Ghana. Their belief in the power of education has worked profound and positive change in the lives of hundreds of children and their families. Paul was a great man, and will be greatly missed. PAMBE Ghana and La'Angum Learning Centre are grateful for his leadership, support, friendship, and vision.

Lending Library Launch!

Few students of La'Angum Learning Centre have access to reading materials in their homes. In 2016, PAMBE Ghana sought donations to build La'Angum Learning Centre's inaugural lending library, so that its students could strengthen their reading skills, foster their personal enjoyment of reading, and help build a culture of reading beyond the school. (Most local children are unable to attend due to space and budget limitations, so many have not yet had the chance to look at a picture book, or learn to read.)

Led by longtime volunteer Suzanne Parker, who designed and implemented a catalogue and check-out card system, the book drive was a huge success. The Metropolitan Public Library System donated lightly used books culled by a team of PAMBE Ghana volunteers. Students from Oklahoma City schools including Heritage Hall, Cleveland Elementary, and Westminster School collected donations of new books. The result: a bounty of 1,765 beautiful children's books that have been sorted, catalogued, and labeled, and are on their way to Ghana by boat.


