

Investing in Teacher Training

PAMBE Ghana is committed to providing quality, bilingual, Montessori based education to the communities served by the La'Angum Learning Center in rural Northern Ghana. One challenge of meeting this goal is training teachers. PAMBE Ghana is meeting that challenge by both providing opportunities for formal teacher education and training teachers in the field.

This has been made possible by the financial support of donors Paul and Ann Milburn. Their landmark 2014 gift of \$20,000 to support teacher education will sponsor two teachers to undertake a 3-year early childhood training course at Ghana Montessori International in Accra; support 2 teachers to obtain the 3-year diploma in basic education offered by the University of Cape Coast in Ghana; and allow accomplished U.S. based Montessori teacher-trainer Patti Yonka to travel to Ghana to observe in the classroom and provide hands on support and teacher instruction at the La'Angum Learning Center.

After meeting with Alice and the Board in December, Ms. Yonka travelled to the East Mamprusi District in January 2015, and will be working there through mid-February. Below is an excerpt from her first report.


"The children are wonderful . . . and the women as they carried firewood on their heads to sell in Langbinsi greeted Alice and me warmly. After the children left, we gathered to discuss how I could work individually with teachers and the staff contributed many ideas. The school has very little water due to many reasons including climate conditions and the collection system is not working properly during the rainy season. There is not enough to complete a week of school so next Friday, will be Water Day, where everyone, parents, students, staff and communities will bring water to fill a tank. One highlight was being able to work with the women of Bongbini as they plastered the floor of a new hut. This is done with a large wooden-type pounder that has a handle to hold on to. As one woman pours water on the floor, the rest, about 12 women, pound and sing their hearts out. Alice joined them and so did ~ Patti Yonka

What is "mother-tongue" based education?

As a child growing up in the East Mamprusi District of Northern Ghana, Alice's formal education was conducted wholly in the English language. Since most students in that rural area began school knowing only their local, tribal language, this "English only" method was a significant barrier to the retention and success of students from the region. One tenet of PAMBE Ghana's educational projects is that children learn first in their local, tribal language, while English is introduced later, generally in the second grade. Students at the La'Angum Learning Center speak Mampruli at home, and their primary education begins in that language. This "mother-tongue" based education for early learners both provides a better foundation for learning, and helps to ensure that the children's first language will be preserved for future generations.

La'Angum Learning Center School Management Committee Formed

Just as the La'Angum Learning Center has been integral to the communities it serves, these communities have been important to the school. In 2007-08, when the school was founded, locals helped clear the land and build the initial structures, and in fact chose the name for the school – the phrase 'La'angum ka toom' meaning teamwork, or many hands make light work. As the school has grown to its present size of 208 students, 13 teachers, and 3 administrators, the local communities have continued to assist in many ways, including by forming work committees to build and maintain the physical structures. As a result, the collaborative model in support of education continues to flourish. The local communities have decided that La'Angum Learning Center was too good to keep to themselves, and have begun to invite other communities to send children to the school. Also in 2014, a local School Management Committee ("SMC") was formed to provide oversight and make recommendations concerning long-term planning, in accordance with the governance practices of the Ghanaian Education In addition to Alice Iddi-Gubbels, this diverse committee is Service ("GES"). composed of the PTA chair, the head teacher, the local assembly person, and a representative from the GES, as well as representatives designated by the local chief, the Imam, and the local Christian bodies. The SMC includes both male and female members. The creation of the SMC reflects the maturation of the school from a seed planted by Alice into a dynamic institution whose roots have taken hold.

Formation of Dorothe Schneebeli Fund Announced

Executive Director Alice Iddi-Gubbels, and her husband, Peter, worked and lived with Christian and Dorothe Schneebeli in Walewale, Ghana in 1980 – 1982, and had the privilege to later visit the Schneebelis in their home country of Switzerland. Their stay in Ghana created a strong bond between the two couples, and they visited one another every two or three years. Most recently, in December 2013, Christian and Dorothe visited La'Angum Learning Center and the local community. Dorothe in particular was impressed by the educational projects, and returned to Switzerland with a determination to support the school in some way.

The local community was also impressed by the remarkable Dorothe – the teachers called her "the Laughing Woman."

Thus it was a shock to all to learn that Dorothe had passed away suddenly and unexpectedly, just weeks after she and Christian returned to Switzerland from Ghana.

Dorothe had a wonderfully embracing personality which deeply touched all who had the good privilege to know her.

In her memory, friends and family donated over \$18,000 to PAMBE Ghana to start an endowment fund. It is with profound gratefulness that PAMBE Ghana announces that the **Dorothe Schneebeli Fund** has now been established through a board-designated fund with Fidelity Investments.
