PAMBE Ghana is proud to announce the impending graduation of its inaugural class of students. These 25 children, who were part of the first class of 40 pre-schoolers who joined La'Angum Learning Center in September 2008 (the other 15 inaugural students were younger and will stay with LLC another year), will graduate from the sixth grade in July 2016, and move to junior high school. Based on the success of the educational model provided by PAMBE Ghana and La'Angum Learning Center, the area District Assembly has committed to building a junior high school to serve the Bumboazio area. Ground has broken on this project, and it is hoped that it will be completed in time for our graduates to enroll in the fall.

Looking Back, Looking Ahead

Reflecting on the impending graduation of La'Angum Learning Center's first enrolled preschool class, I considered PAMBE Ghana's first annual report, which we titled "Looking Back, Looking Ahead."

In that 2008 report, we shared information about the hard work of beginning this educational project: raising funds from friends to provide the seed money and tools needed; choosing Bumboazio as the right community in which to place the school, despite the complete lack of school infrastructure there; con-



firmation that the decision was a good one, when despite being the busiest time of year for this farming community, the people showed up with unwavering resolve to break ground and build the first classroom, office, latrines and pavilion; developing a system by which the first class of 40 preschool students could be chosen equitably from a field of more than 100 candidates; finding and training two teachers and

a program coordinator; organizing the community to provide and prepare a daily meal for the students; adapting key principles of the Montessori teaching method to the local community; and meeting with groups including the Ghana Education Service and District Assemblies in the East and West Mamprusi Districts, the Ghana Institute of Linguistics, Literacy and Bible Translators ("GILLBT"), Ghana Health Services, Northern Region Water and Sanitation Program, and Catholic Relief Services - to name a few - to explore collaboration. In that regard, I worked with two local experienced teachers and highly respected traditional leaders to create a robust Advisory Committee which was key to early development and putting down community roots. The Advisory Committee visited para-

mount chiefs in each district, starting with the King of Mamprugu, participated actively in visibility studies and facilitated contacts with the GES.

Bumboazio was chosen as the site for the school in May and by September, the classroom, office, latrines and pavilion had been built; the classrooms furnished with materials; and the first group of 40 children arrived with trust that La'Angum School would educate them. "Looking back" at these ambitious first steps, it is hard to believe that 25 of these children are about to graduate and are "looking ahead" to a transition to junior high school. The collaborative efforts on both sides of the Atlantic behind this achievement could fill this entire newsletter. Thank you to each one of you who took part in this grand project.

Our school has grown in these eight years to encompass 16 teachers, a head of school, more than 200 students — all thriving on a campus of seven classrooms, a kitchen, offices, a library and computer lab. The challenges for the future include raising funds to support equitable teacher compensation, provide training, improve the deteriorating water catchment and storage system, and assist our graduates in their transition to junior high school. We hope you will join us as we move forward into the future.

The Water Dilemma

As many know, the challenge of providing sufficient water to support the school is daunting. In remote northern Ghana, women and girls are typically tasked with the labor of bringing water from streams or distant wells, by hand and on foot. To lessen this burden and take advantage of the annual rainy season, PAMBE Ghana has installed guttering along most

school structures to catch water and built 6 concrete tanks to store the water captured. However, it has been discovered that these tanks have deteriorated so badly that much of the water is being lost through seepage, causing the school to lack adequate water supply.

Contractors have

submitted a good plan to remedy the situation, but at a cost of \$14,886 which is not in the budget. PAMBE Ghana would welcome any support to help pay for the remedial construction work necessary to provide water for the school.

Of the many logistical obstacles faced by the staff and students of La'Angum Learning Center, one is the difficulty of moving basic supplies between the closest major towns to remote Bumboazio, where the school is located. The distance is long and the roads are in very poor condition, more akin to rutted dirt tracks. When Board members and friends visited La'Angum Learning Center in the summer of 2015, they experienced this logistical transportation problem first hand. Traveler Sam Bowman undertook the personal mission to raise funds to obtain a "Motor King" for La'Angum Learning Center, a useful vehicle the travelers

observed being used in other spots in rural Northern Ghana. The Motor King is essentially a three wheeled vehicle with a large bed, perfect for hauling. It's built to withstand the punishment dealt by the dirt roads in the area.

Sam's fundraiser was successful and the Motor King arrived at the school in early March to much excitement and fanfare.
